Salvation for All People

"We believe the good news of God's salvation in Jesus Christ is for all people. Christ commands the church to make disciples of all nations by calling people to repent, and by baptizing and teaching them to obey Jesus. Jesus teaches that disciples are to love God and neighbour by telling the good news and by doing acts of love and compassion" (MB Confession of Faith).

As some of you know, my mother passed away very shortly after receiving a cancer diagnosis this past summer. I see the world a bit differently after those ten days at Abbotsford Hospice Society's Holmberg House.

One particularly powerful moment was when a lady and her son visited my mother. It turns out that she is one of the 87 people who repented, was baptized, and is now obeying Jesus through the ministry of my parents and their many friends and supporters at South Abbotsford M.B. Church (1980 - 2000).

This wonderful lady prayed powerfully for my mom and then shared her testimony with me; how through my mother's life she was impacted with the Gospel of Jesus Christ and is now

living for Him along with her adult son and his wife. The son told me, "We are now working on our extended family!" Wow.

Seventy-five years ago, MEI was founded on the values and beliefs of the dear Mennonites who had immigrated to the Fraser Valley in the 1920s primarily from Russia. These people were fleeing persecution that is too horrible to describe here. Our family's own Opa and Omi

(Ben & Martha Janzen) came to Yarrow and Abbotsford during this time. It was the children and grandchildren of these immigrants who were responsible for bringing the Manuel family to Abbotsford with the hopes that my parents would be able to reach out with the good news of Jesus to the Indian peoples settling in this community in their own language. Why? Because they believed that salvation is for all people. Without the vision of these people of God, a church of purely new believers in Jesus would never have been established here. Again, wow! Praise God!

Friends, let's make this the year of telling and sharing of the love, joy, and peace that we can all experience as a result of a Holy Spirit led life.

... "for, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved." How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can anyone preach unless they are sent? As it is written: "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"" Romans 10:13-15

Let us be the ones to bring the good news to those who are in our circles of influence, for "We [continue to] believe [as did the Mennonites who established MEI] that the good news of God's salvation in Jesus Christ is for all people" (MB Confession of Faith).


Do you feel called? If so, perhaps you could serve as a chapel speaker or participate in an alumni worship band.

MCC Colombia Adventure Tour

Along with nine Canadians, I travelled the San Juan River in Choco, Columbia last May. Our boat travelled under the protection of four unarmed Mennonite Brethren pastors. Their relationships of trust with the drug gangs was our protection from assault. Between January and May, 36 community workers were killed in this region as they sought to bring alternative farming and peace. We were on a Mennonite Central Committee Learning Tour

taking us back to Mennonite Brethren church plants established in the 1950's.

We visited an agricultural processing plant operated and maintained by Pastor Javez with support of MCC. It is the single processing plant in this region. Farmers travel the river to process rice and cocoa (chocolate) beans, providing an alternative livelihood from coco (cocaine). Drug gangs pressure farmers to grow coco (cocaine) and threaten them or take their land when they choose alternate crops. Villagers want nothing more than provide a safe life and future for their children. MCC runs Peace Clubs for the children to give

them teaching on friendship, trust and peaceful living. Gunfire during Peace Clubs made it unsafe to meet outdoors. Parents join to learn principles of friendship and reconciliation. Every life has been touched by drugs, murder, threats or retaliation. Forgiveness and reconciliation are miracles and a difficult path forward to break the cycle of violence.

I am profoundly impacted as I think about the contrast of ease and safety that I know in Canada and Colombians wish they had in these rural villages. To see how they look to us for encouragement in their faith and efforts to provide a safe life is compelling. There is

much more to process, but the shift in my heart and mind will forever change how I engage with and seek to support others – near and far.

Outdoor Enhancement Project Comes To Life

MEI Middle School is a place bursting with student energy and enthusiasm. It's long been established that developmentally Middle Schoolers need to move and be active. Our students enjoy sharing the playground and fields on campus; but there is very little green space immediately adjacent around the middle school building, and in that small area we have wrestled long and hard with drainage issues and mud.

As we began to dream about enhancing this outdoor space, we wanted to create "a gathering space" that middle schoolers would enjoy but also a space that would allow some activity. Our dreams gained some momentum as the Middle School PAC got behind the vision and our students participated in a number of hot lunch sales to raise funds for the project. To top off the fundraising, we added a record Entertainment book sale and raised additional funds through some pop-up food sales.

This October, we were pleased to unveil Phase 1 of our Outdoor Enhancement Project. This included pouring concrete and installing five exercise stations: The Airwalker; an Elliptical; Chest Press; Recumbent Bike/Hand Bike; and Plyometric Station.

The outdoor area will be further enhanced next spring with Phase II involving the installation of an outdoor ping-pong table and new basketball hoops. Some outdoor seating and conversational areas will bring the project to a close in Phase III.

We enjoyed a few days of sunshine this fall which demonstrated that the

exercise stations will be well used. Now, even in inclement weather, it's a joy to look out the window to watch students gathered around taking turns using the outdoor equipment.

We would like to express our appreciation to all who have supported this project and especially acknowledge those parents who faithfully serve on our Hot Lunch committee. We appreciate Nathan Neudorf, Shaun Maddigan and Erik Bird, from Facilities who installed the equipment. MEI—Laying a New Foundation

In the summer of 1945 my parents enrolled my sister Lillian and I in the new Mennonite Educational Institute located only half a mile from our house on Emerson Road. It had been founded in 1944 through the collaboration of Mennonite Brethren and the Conference of Mennonites churches in the Abbotsford area. Franz Thiessen had been engaged as principal and only grades 9 and 10 were initially offered.

Lillian and I had completed eighth grade at Mt. Lehman Middle School and our natural destination would have been Philip Sheffield High School in Abbotsford. We knew about that school because as boys we had been bused there from Mt. Lehman for basic classes in woodwork, metalwork, lettering for making signs, etc. Samples of our work graced walls in our homes. So why consider the new MEI?

For starters, it was a Christian Mennonite school with a faith-based curriculum in the Christian Education building on the church property of the South Abbotsford Mennonite Brethren Church. Proximity to our home after being bused to school for four years also made us more available for work on our parent's dairy and berry farm. As a family we had recently climbed out of poverty and could afford the minimal tuition fee. All five of us Peter J. Stobbe children eventually graduated from the newly-built MEI and went on to college, where we found our MEI studies were greatly appreciated.

Reflecting on that revealed important experiences.

1. Our Mennonite Brethren perspective on Christianity was quickly expanded by students from the General Conference Mennonite Churches—with the MEI the first cooperative venture between the two local versions of Mennonites from Russia.

1944- Original MEI campus; a 26' X 46' addition was made to the South Abbotsford Bible School building

- 2. Franz Thiessen, our music and German teacher insisted on us memorizing all 420 or so lines of the German poem, "Das Lied von der Glocke," by Goethe. My sister and I spent hours memorizing the words while pumping water at a neighbor's well when lack of wind silenced the pump action. Students also participated in a dramatic musical version as a fundraiser. The dramatization even traveled to Sardis, though students from there were being enlisted in Sharon Mennonite Collegiate Institute, started in 1945 in Yarrow.
- 3. William Neufeld taught English, Geography and basics of agriculture—which my father promptly implemented. Before we completed grade nine we had to identify world capitals and place them within half an inch of their location on a map. That knowledge came into play when I visited many countries as a book authoring specialist and publisher.
- 4. Principal Dyck taught math with enthusiasm, while always carrying a yardstick to point to illustrations on the blackboard. Discipline was never an issue.
- 5. Our chapels featured visiting Christian leaders, introducing us to the many facets of Christian service. After one of those visits a spiritual revival broke out and a number of somewhat rebellious students did an about turn and accepted Christ as their Saviour.
- 6. Even though German was still the language at home, we had Bible study classes in English, preparing us to enter the English-speaking world of our neighbors—and helping us reach out in Sunday School and VBS classes into neighborhoods not served by churches.

The dream started in the Abbotsford Female Hockey Association Novice age group. Desiree played five years in the AFHA before playing one year in the BC Hockey Female Major Midget League and is currently playing in the Junior ranks with the Pacific Steelers that play in the highly regarded JWHL that travel across Canada and the United States to play against the best Grade 11-12 and post grad players in these countries. It is the Junior Steelers that helped Desiree learn the game at the highest levels and has helped her achieve her dream of playing University level hockey.

Desiree also feels that while her community hockey teams and coaches helped her learn to play the game, it was the extra ice time, coaches and skill development from the MEI Hockey Canada Skills Academy that gave her the opportunity to be at her best. Desiree thanks all of her coaches and teachers from MEI for the support and help in getting her this amazing opportunity with Trinity. Desiree is making history as she commits to Trinity as the first ever signed female U-Sport Hockey Athlete in Trinity's history. She also has a family connection to Trinity as her cousin, Chris Wiens is the assistant coach for the Trinity's men's hockey team. Chris Trendall, another assistant coach of that same men's team, coached Desiree in the MEI Academy for many years as her skills coach.

As MEI Hockey and Trinity Hockey both share similar values and intentional character development, it is great to see another MEI athlete make that commitment to continue attending a Christian athletics program and school. Desiree will lace up her skates for the Trinity Western Spartans in their inaugural season in the fall of 2020.

spiritual growth opportunities that exist as coaches intentionally foster an awareness of God's role in creating athletes and how we can worship Him with our play.


