MEI Applied Skills have adapted their entire programs to continue to foster growth and develop skill sets while at home. Woodworking is a very hands-on subject and attracts students who like to be in in a shop environment rather than be in a classroom. Students were challenged to finish projects at home if they had the resources or even design and build their own projects. The students who didn't have any means to be able to do this came up with projects that could be made in the shop in the future. Along with this, students have been learning some theory on identifying trees and how trees grow and diseases that affect them.

In drafting the Grade 9's had to start a brand-new program that is not usually taught at MEI. They have adapted well and are right on track with their assignments and projects. The Grade 11/12 students have been designing real-world items for their parents and friends including barns, basements, kitchens and even electrical layouts.

Students recently in devotions were challenged with the question, "What have you discovered about yourself that you did not know before" The questions were varied but a common theme was that they all enjoy school and structure and that they are really glad that God has got this and is in control. I feel through Devotions online the students have connected probably better and participated more than they do in the classroom when most of them don't want to speak up in front of their peers.







MEI teachers played a foundational role in my life; because of their influence I chose majors in Biology and in History. I chose the teaching profession because I realized that teachers impact students tremendously. It was the staff at MEI who placed the reinforcing rods into my Christian faith. It was the MEI that gave me a keen interest in the world about me, including current events, cultural values, and the need for Christian service.

And how did this foundation present itself? The thirst for adventure, Christian service and sharing the Good News were motivators. The influential message from Wm Neufeld was "Students, Canada is greater than Abbotsford. It is huge. See it and serve the Lord." I tried to apply his vision. A by-product of service just could be a wonderful spouse (and so it was). I became a teacher and served with MCC in Northern Newfoundland. Then three years in the Arctic and finally in the Peace River country. I was a Teacher, Principal and School District Superintendent. This was followed by a short stint with SFU in Fort Nelson. Then came an early "retirement" at 57 and my work began as I continued to find opportunities for serving the Lord.

In 1992, immediately after the Soviet Union collapsed, we were asked to help set up a Christian based liberal arts college in Lithuania. Yes, I was to be the president (and no PhD)! This is now a full-fledged university with 700 students from 50 countries. Then came retirement again and now at 88 I am still serving as a counsellor in the local church in Fort St. John. The community does have people with needs and needy folks don't mind seeing an old man for help. One of these years I will retire.

Thank you Dr. Dan Froese, Bill Wiebe, Wm Neufeld, F.C. Thiessen, and others; for getting me interested in nature, in seeing the world, in serving our Lord, and emphasizing others rather than self. Thank you, MEI, for assisting me in the foundation building aspect of my life.


